



REconciling sScience, Innovation and Precaution through the Engagement of Stakeholders

RECIPES IN A NUTSHELL > The precautionary principle has been recognised as a general principle in EU law and in various EU regulations and directives. It is supposed to prevent environmental and health risks from arising in the first place. It encourages early and forward-looking action to minimise risks, for example in the use of nanotechnologies or pesticides. Critics of the precautionary principle argue, however, that it promotes excessive caution and hinders technological innovation. The project "REconciling sScience, Innovation and Precaution through the Engagement of Stakeholders" (RECIPES) **aims to analyse how the precautionary principle is applied in the European Union and improve its future application with recourse to methods of societal actor engagement.**

Essentially, RECIPES is developing **guidance on the future application of the precautionary principle in EU innovation policy and risk governance.** The development of the guidance is informed by the results of a stock-taking study on the use of the precautionary principle since 2000; a range of case studies on the application of the precautionary principle in different areas; and continuous engagement with different societal actors through interviews, webinars, workshops, and a digital platform.

The main outcome of the workshop will be summarized in a concise workshop documentation and made available to the participants.

OUTLOOK

The participants will be invited to the RECIPES final conference which will be held on 10-11 May 2022.
